1996 and from 1998-00 — beating Cox's Braves twice. After making only one trip to the playoffs in 14 seasons with the New York Mets, St. Louis and Atlanta, Torre guided the Yankees to the postseason in all 12 of his years in New York with a cool, patient demeanor. His popularity ranked Steinbrenner.

"George Steinbrenner changed my life giving me that opportunity at the end of '85," said Torre, the seventh Yankees manager to be elected to the Hall. "He just wanted to win. He felt he owed it to the city. Maybe, the fact I was a New Yorker, it really struck a nerve with me."

Torre finished his career by leading the Los Angeles Dodgers to two NL West titles in three seasons, retiring after 2010 with a record of 2,326-1,997. He's the only manager to have more than 2,000 hits as a

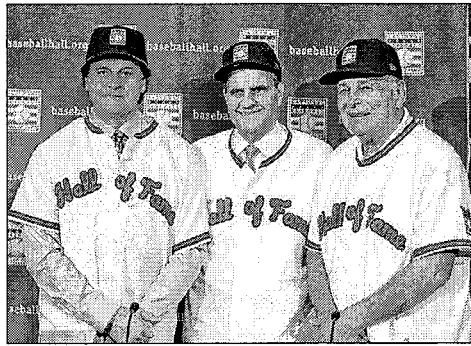
player — he was the 1971 NL MVP — and 2,000 wins in the dugout.

"Joe taught a lot of us about how to win the right way and lose the right way," La Russa said.

The savvy La Russa won three World Series titles with Oakland in 1989 and with St. Louis in 2006 and '11, retiring days after beating the Texas Rangers in a seven-game thriller. Of the nine managers with three or more World Series titles, the other seven all have been inducted.

La Russa finished with the third-most wins by a manager in a career that began with the Chicago White Sox in 1979 and ended with a record of 2,728-2,365.

"I miss the winning and losing," La Russa said. "Someday I'll be with a team, I think. I'd like to be part of the competition again."

Cox's managerial career began in 1978 with Atlanta, and he was fired after four seasons — only one above .500. A four-year run in Toronto ended in 1985

with an AL East title, and Ted Turner lured him back to the Braves as their GM. Cox returned to the dugout in 1990, and following one losing season he went on

one of the most successful regular-season runs by any skipper, leading the Braves to 14 straight division titles and a World Series championship in 1995.

"But when the squirrel runs across home plate while your team is trying to pitch, there is nothing you can do about that. So you really start to realize there are a lot of things out of your control. It takes more than nine guys. It takes nine guys, and it takes the 25 on the roster. It takes the coaches, the staff, and it takes a lot of luck."

Halladay played for the Phillies from 2010-13, finishing with two injury-plagued seasons. He won an NL Cy Young Award in 2010, throwing a perfect game that season and a no-hitter in his first postseason appearance.

Halladay was 203-105 with a 3.38 ERA in 416 career games, including 390 starts. He had 67 complete games and 20 shutouts. His resume includes three 20-win seasons, eight All-Star games, and three other top-3 finishes for the Cy Young Award.

Known as a workhorse, Halladay led the league in innings four times and in complete games seven times.

Halladay was a six-time All-Star, won the 2003 AL Cy Young Award and went 148-76 with a 3.43 ERA in 12 seasons with the Blue Jays. He was traded to the Phillies after the 2009 season, and was 40-16 with a 2.40 ERA in his first two years in Philadelphia. But back and shoulder issues limited Halladay in 2012-

13. He was 15-13 with a 5.15 ERA in 38 starts.

Halladay had shoulder surgery during the season and returned in September, but clearly wasn't right. He was 4-5 with a 6.82 ERA in 13 starts this year.

"It's so much fun to play the game and go out and compete," he said. "I looked forward to that fifth day more than anything. To go out there and know it's not going to feel good and I wasn't going to do it the way I wanted was frustrating. I tried to give everything I can but something was holding me back. I felt I couldn't give them what I wanted to."

Despite Halladay's decline, the Phillies were still interested in bringing him back for another year if he was healthy and at a price much lower than the \$20 million he earned in each of the last three seasons. He was a popular teammate and a valued presence in the clubhouse for his influence and strong work ethic.

"Roy Halladay is the ultimate competitor," second baseman Chase Utley said.

"He is by far the hardest worker that I've ever seen and treated every game as if it were his last. It was no coincidence why he was the best pitcher of his era. I'm honored to have had the opportunity to watch him pitch for four years. I'll miss his presence and passion but, most of all, I will miss his intensity."

McCarron completed 67 percent of his passes for 2,676 yards and 26 touchdowns for the fourth-ranked Crimson Tide (11-1).

"This will be my first trip to New York City, and I can't put into words how much it means to me," McCarron said in a

statement released by the school. "I am truly privileged to have the opportunity to represent our team at the Heisman ceremony. None of this would be possible without my coaches and teammates."

Mason helped No. 2 Auburn reach the BCS title game, running for

304 yards and four TDs in the SEC championship game. He is ninth in the country in rushing (124 ypg).

"When I heard the news, I was in disbelief," Mason said in a statement. "For me to be invited to the Heisman ceremony, I am honored and blessed. I

couldn't have done it without my teammates, this is an honor for all of them also."

Williams is the nation's leading rusher at 175 yards per game and the 16th player in FBS to run for 2,000 yards in a season.

Winston's arrival as Florida State's starting

quarterback was being touted as a major event in the spring and he has surpassed the hype. The Alabama native is on pace to break the NCAA record for passer efficiency rating (190.1) and has already set records for yards passing (3,820) and TD passes (38) for a freshman.

**YOU COULD RECEIVE BENEFITS FROM A SETTLEMENT with PA Child Care, LLC; Western PA Child Care, LLC; and Mid Atlantic Youth Services Corp.**

A partial settlement has been entered into on behalf of juvenile and parent/guardian Settlement Class Members with PA Child Care, LLC ("PACC"), Western PA Child Care, LLC ("WPACC"), and Mid Atlantic Youth Services Corp. ("MAYS") (referred to in this notice as the "Provider Defendants"). The Provider Defendants will pay \$2.5 million into a Cash Settlement Fund in three installments. This Notice is a description of important terms of the Master Settlement Agreement ("MSA" or "Agreement"), but it does not set forth every term of that Agreement or modify that Agreement. You may obtain a copy of the entire MSA or the Mailed Notice with more detail at [www.kidswinsettlement.com](http://www.kidswinsettlement.com).

If you believe you qualify to receive a payment as part of this settlement, you may submit a Proof of Claim form to participate in this partial settlement, exclude yourself from the settlement, or object to it.

The United States District Court for the Middle District of Pennsylvania authorized this notice. The Court will have a hearing to consider whether to approve this settlement, so that the benefits may be paid.

**WHO'S INCLUDED?**

You are a Juvenile Settlement Class Member or Parent/Guardian Settlement Class Member, as defined in the MSA, if you fall into either of the following groups:

- Juvenile Settlement Class Members:** all juveniles who appeared before former Judge Ciavarella at any time between January 1, 2003 and May 28, 2008 and who were adjudicated delinquent and/or placed in a detention center by former Judge Ciavarella.
- Parent Settlement Class Members:** all parents and/or legal guardians of Juvenile Settlement Class Members who made payments in their own name as a result of his or her child's adjudication or placement and who did not receive full compensation for payments made in their name in the Mericle Settlement.

**WHAT'S THIS ABOUT?**

Various class action lawsuits and individual lawsuits were filed against the Provider Defendants and other defendants. The lawsuits allege that the Provider Defendants and other defendants violated the Juveniles' constitutional rights, the Racketeer Influenced and Corrupt Organizations Act ("RICO"), and Pennsylvania law.

This settlement resolves all claims against the Released Parties, which includes the Provider Parties and Zappala Parties. The Provider Defendants have not admitted to doing anything wrong, and the Court has not found that the Provider Defendants have done anything wrong. However, the Provider Defendants wish to enter into this MSA to release the Released Parties, as defined in the MSA, from any potential liability and to end all further litigation by the Juveniles and the Parents against these parties.

The class action and individual lawsuits will continue against certain Non-Released Parties, as defined in the MSA, including the former Judges Ciavarella and Conahan, Robert Powell, and Vision Holdings, LLC.

**HOW DO I RECEIVE A PAYMENT?**

You must submit a Proof of Claim form to the Claims Committee in order to receive a payment. You will also have to sign a Release Form to authorize the Claims Committee to order records to verify your information and calculate your payment.

The Proof of Claim Form must be mailed so that it is physically received by the Claims Committee by the Proof of Claim deadline: January 21, 2014. You will not be permitted to participate in the Settlement if you miss this deadline.

**HOW MUCH WILL I RECEIVE?**

Settlement Class Category	Base Award
1. Probation Only .....	1 Point*
2. Non-PACC/WPACC .....	2 Points*
[if you were adjudicated & placed in a facility other than PACC/WPACC]	
3. PACC/WPACC .....	5 Points*
[if you were adjudicated and placed in PACC and/or WPACC for any period of time, you fall in this category]	
4. Parents/Guardians .....	actual amount paid**

\* The value of each point will depend on the number of Juvenile Class Members who participate in the Settlement. The total number of points for all Juvenile Settlement Class Members will be divided into the Juvenile Fund to determine the monetary value of each point.

\*\* Parents/guardians will only be reimbursed for payments made in their name for which they have not yet received compensation. If the actual amount of awards exceeds the amount allotted for parents/guardians under the plan of allocation, parent/guardian will receive a pro-rata share of their actual award. **WHAT ARE MY OTHER OPTIONS?**

If you do not want to be legally bound by this settlement, you must exclude yourself — or opt-out — by the Proof of Claim deadline: January 21, 2014. If you opt-out, you cannot get money from this settlement and may continue individually to proceed against the Provider Defendants. If you want to be included in the settlement but do not agree to all the terms, you can object. The complete Notice describes how to opt-out or object.
